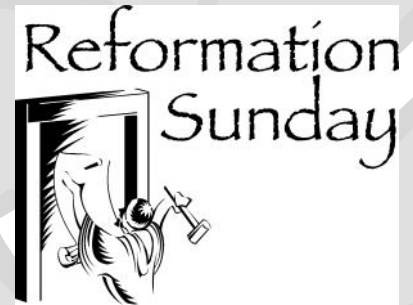

From Intern Miranda Hinrichs



It has been a full and blessed couple of months since I arrived here in WI. It has been so nice to enjoy the beauty of the Lord's creation as I have explored the local highways and parks. This is beautiful country here. I love the farmland and barns. The rolling hills are so inviting and when combined with some colorful sunsets; the beauty calls me to pause and worship, to worship our creative God who has entrusted so much to us.

We are all entrusted with so much. Talents, spiritual gifts, money, friendships, the care of children or adults, roles as students or in our careers. You are entrusted with much. In Luke 16 Jesus says, "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much." In the last weeks I have been reflecting on the "little" and the "much" that I have been entrusted with. How do I handle it faithfully? It can be a daunting and humbling thing to be entrusted with something.

I am excited as I begin this internship year. However, it is also humbling, and I feel the weight of responsibility of a new role. I am thankful for the warm welcome that you have offered and for all of the opportunities to get to know members through conversation, visits, and teaming together in ministry. It is an honor and a joy to be entrusted with your stories. I pray that I may be a faithful steward in the months ahead. I am looking forward to serving, ministering, growing, and worshipping alongside one another.

I was asked to share a little bit about my involvement in Taekwondo. I have trained and competed in Taekwondo for the last 21 years. Participation in the art has provided many opportunities to train alongside and share life with some amazing people (including Olympians and even my mom and my sister) and to compete all over the U.S. and in Canada, Mexico, and Korea. I recently qualified for the Pan Am Team Trials at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. The competition was intense, and I did not make the team. I enjoy the physical aspect of taekwondo, of pushing a body to new limits, of training hard and competing with fierceness. Over the years, though, it has not been high level tournaments that keep me involved. It is the people. It is an honor to share life with people, to train hard with them, and to somehow seek to be a good steward of those relationships and be a witness to Christ's work in my life and in the world.

There is always more to learn; but how do we be faithful with what we do know or with where we are now? As Christians, how do we best give away and/or use what we have been given? In Luke 16 being shrewd is lifted up as well, so maybe being faithful also involves being shrewd and discerning our gifts and call in order to know how to best be faithful. I am taking some time to discern how to best be a faithful steward of my Taekwondo interest in this next stage of life. Our creative abilities, our finances, our skills, our physical talents, our time, our professional expertise, our friendships, our interests... these are all things that we have been entrusted with. How might you be a shrewd and faithful steward of them in the days and weeks ahead?

May the Lord bless your cunning and insightful discernment of what you are invited into as a faithful steward. And as a community may we come alongside one another in the weeks and months ahead to help each other see what the Lord is up to in our lives.

From Pastor Clint



Dear People of God at East Koshkonong Lutheran Church,

For some time now I have looked to the Apostle Paul for spiritual mentorship. I admire his tremendous faith, the care he took with words in the authoring of his letters, and his courage to travel wherever the Spirit led him to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. I spend a lot of time reading his letters, and turn to them especially in those times when I need clarity of vision, or guidance through transition.

As our family has begun juggling the many tasks involved with selling one home, buying another, moving everything we own, saying goodbye to one community of faith and anticipating another, a somewhat obscure verse in one of Paul's lesser known letters has caught my eye.

Paul's second letter to Timothy includes some intriguing personal instructions. He says, "Do your best to come to me soon... when you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, also the books, and above all the parchments" (2 Timothy 4:9, 13). This verse intrigues me because it offers a small window into what life must have been like for Paul as an itinerant preacher and evangelist. It is likely that Paul had recently been jailed and then released, and so some of his most valuable possessions are with Timothy, his "beloved child" (1 Timothy 1:2). Paul is on the move not just because he is called by the Spirit from place to place, but also out of necessity, because his proclamation of Jesus Christ and him crucified often results in hardship and persecution.

Winter is coming soon (for Paul, as well as for us), so the cloak is of great importance. It may have been his only cloak; most men of his economic class owned only one, worth five to ten weeks wages. So in this short personal request, we can be inspired by Paul's simplicity of life. I'm also inspired by his singularity of focus. The only other thing he needs are his books (probably scrolls or codexes of what we now call the Old Testament), and parchments (valuable paper or leather on which to write).

This past week, a very kind man from the moving company that will help us move took a drive with me out to the church to look at my office. He had already walked through our house, and made a rough estimate of how much everything we own might weigh (16,990 pounds, if you're curious). We had to drive to my office to look at the shelves and shelves of books. This is another reason I look to Paul as a mentor--after clothes, the main thing I pack for a trip are my books, and sometimes books take up more space and definitely more weight than the clothes.

So Paul, in the midst of hardship and struggle, is focused on continuing in his study of Scripture, and maintains his ministry to the many young congregations he has begun, by making sure he has enough parchment to write them letters, and Scripture resources around him to keep him faithful and grounded in his book of faith. Then, while reading these books of Scripture, he writes long, faithful, passionate letters that have continued to shape and bless the Christian church for over 2000 years.

I'm trying to keep this story of Paul in mind while we do our own packing and preparing to move. What is most central? What do we value? As people called by the Spirit to have partnered with you in the ministry of the gospel, are we as focused as Paul in keeping to the essentials and proclaiming the gospel in every way, including how we pack? I pray that we have been, and that you will continue to keep that faith even as we now serve the one gospel of Jesus Christ in different places.

Thank you to all of you for your graciousness as we prepare to move and accept this new call. You are a blessing.

Building Repair Loan Repayment Update

Beginning in June 2008, EKLC took out loans to cover needed repairs around the building. After all was said and done, the loan our church had with Cambridge State Bank was \$205,633.20. A principal payment was made to CSB in May 2009 for \$25,759.00. Since February 2010, EKLC has been making payments to CSB on a monthly basis based contributions EKLC members have made towards the Building Repair Fund. To date, this is the status of that loan:

September 19, 2010 Council Minutes

Present at the meeting: Steve Wagner, Trudy Spike, Kurt Klemp, Sabra Jacobson, Pastor Clint Schnekloth, Jaime Lewellin, Miranda Hinrichs, Peggy Luther, and Bonnie Ehrke. Not present: Elizabeth Kaashagen

Meeting opened with a reading focused on "Harvesting Laborers"

Pastor motioned to make an amendment to the Agenda, adding to New Business a Letter from Luther Seminary. Motion to discuss this letter made by Trudy and seconded by Peggy. Motion was unanimously approved. Sabra Motioned to approve the consent agenda pending clarification from Elizabeth on the Financial report (#20271 for cemetery to Alliant Energy) Trudy seconded all approved. Consent agenda discussed and placed on file.

Pastor added an amendment to his September report. Due to recent financial cuts, there will be a meeting to discuss some possible layoffs in the ELCA office. Therefore the ELCA has postponed the Baptismal meeting that PC planned on attending on October 11th.

OLD Business:

Update on memorials to EKLC – how information is compiled and stored. The council asks that committees communicate what they are doing with the congregation/council. Request made to the investment committee, on a quarterly basis, to submit an updated report of the funds to the council. Council also requests from the Office and Financial staff to compile a monthly report of memorials given to EKLC.

Asset mapping/action plan – to compose and put action plan in place by 2011 to focus on.

**Council needs to follow up once a request has been made.

NEW Business:

Budget Giving and Spending – A sub-committee formed to review how we are doing with our budget and spending (Holly Loomis, Peggy & Brian Luther, Bonnie Ehrke, Harriet Eikland, Wilma Furseth and Miranda Hindrichs). This is an **unofficial** committee interested in discussing the formation of our congregational budget. Next meeting planned to take place on September 21st at 6 pm in the Council room. Invitation especially extended to the Investment fund committee.

Budget 2011: Committee formation will start soon. Anyone interested in assisting with forming the 2011 budget should get in contact with President Steve Wagner.

Luther Seminary Scholarship – formal letter from seminary college requesting that EKLC, the home church of Lindsay Stolen, support her in assisting to pay her seminary tuition (\$12,000 annually or \$6,000 semester). Steve motioned that the congregation sponsor a seminarian 1/2 tuition for 2010 semester, 1/2 tuition for 2011 semester. This motion seconded by Bonnie. Council has extended an invitation to Lindsay to come here to be a guest pastor on October 17th, which she has accepted. At that time a special offering will take place to go towards her tuition. Council will also check with the status of the endowment fund and if this is an option for financial support.

Pastor Clint departure

Call process is 3 steps

Closure – time to say good bye and close on our end with Pastor

Interim – prepare to receive an interim pastor (synod will help to find one that fits our congregational needs and one that will, hopefully, be a supervisor for Current intern, Miranda)

Call Process – Expected to be 6-9 months to find a fitting pastor for our congregation.

Closure

Pastors official last day preaching will be on November 14th 2010, but will remain in the church "tying up loose ends" until December 10th.

Board of pension paperwork and social security paperwork – Pastor will work with Holly Loomis in order to complete this.



Insurance for Pastor & family will officially end December 31st 2010.
 Communicate with congregation – Sabra will submit a notice for the September/October newsletter and bulletin to update on steps.
 Exit Interview – Personnel Committee (Bonnie and Sabra) will formulate and conduct using reference questions from the synod.
 Exit Checklist – found in a handbook provided by the synod Pastor will complete and council will oversee this completion
 Farewell Celebration – Congregation will officially say “Good-Bye” to Pastor Clint and family on November 14th 2010. Service will be followed by a good ol’ fashioned pot luck! Included in handbook is a service to be performed by assistant pastors for outgoing Pastor Clint (PC will discuss this with current assistant pastors).

Meeting ended with the Lord’s Prayer.

Sabra motion to adjourn, unanimously approved.

A Letter From Our Missionaries ~ The Haugs August 28, 2010



Dear Friends,

A week ago, the General Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Slovakia Milos Klatik welcomed a new group of ELCA volunteers who will teach English in the Lutheran schools of Slovakia. It was a sign of an important legacy. During the early years of communism, the government closed the religious schools that were supported by the church. Schools were perceived by the government as an important tool in controlling the youth and the future of the nation; church supported school, however, would allow too many questions to be asked of the communist state. When Czechoslovakia celebrated the political changes of 1989 in its sweeping Velvet Revolution, the church leaders began to examine their history, and they immediately recognized the significance of the church schools. They saw the importance of bilingual education, and in particular, the English language, but they weren't sure whether they had the capacity and gifts to teach English. And so the Slovak Lutheran Church turned to their brothers and sisters in America and in the ELCA. When the Evangelical Lyceum in Bratislava was re-opened in the fall of 1991, ELCA volunteer teachers were there to begin the work of teaching English and sharing the gospel through the English language. For 19 years, ELCA volunteers of all ages have been welcomed to share their gifts in the Slovak Lutheran schools. A year ago, the doors to a Lutheran high school in Poland were opened to the ELCA as well. And so, an important legacy of teaching continues.



A week ago marked another momentous event. Certainly not as historical as the 1989 Velvet Revolution and the fall of the Berlin Wall, but it was momentous for our family. Our oldest son Vitali began his college career at St. Cloud State University. As parents, it was odd not to see him walk into the dorm for the first time, or to feel the buzz on the university campus as the students and families unloaded the most important of their worldly possessions. We were of course back in Bratislava, so Vitali's grandfather brought him to St. Cloud for "moving in day." We are slowly getting used to only three of us being seated at the dinner table. Alexei is not particularly pleased with having our "undivided attention."



In the last week before Vitali began his "college years," he was presented his Boy Scout Eagle Award at a Court of Honor in Stillwater. His three aunts and cousin watched as he was presented the award along with Morgan Ludtke, another graduating senior and Eagle Scout from his former Troop 114. Vitali's godmother Pauline Haug served as his "mother" for the evening, pinning the Eagle award on him. We were grateful for the troop arranging this special Court of Honor.

This is a time of new beginnings for others in ministry in Europe as well. This week, 14 Young Adults in Global Mission or YAGM's will begin their year of service in Great Britain, Hungary and Slovakia. Two new ELCA pastors are beginning their service at the American Lutheran Church in Oslo and the American Church in Berlin, and another pastor is serving as the interim pastor at the International Church in Copenhagen. Please keep all of these important ministries in your prayers.

We are thankful for your prayers, your interest and your financial support. These are difficult economic times for many congregations in the ELCA. It is hard to make financial commitments in a time of uncertainty. But as we pray for the ELCA and its global mission, let us remember the historical tradition of service around the world which has been at the very heart of our call as a church. In global mission, "Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, and today, and forever." Hebrews 13:8.

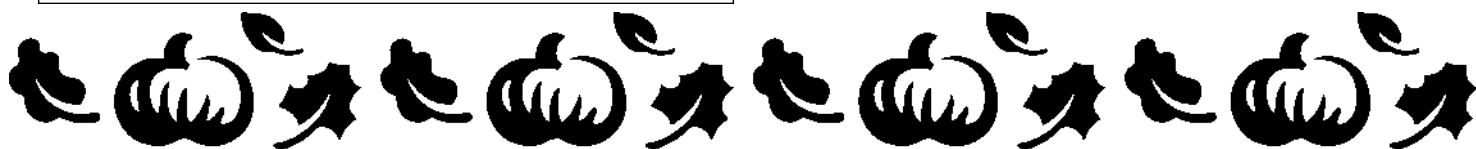

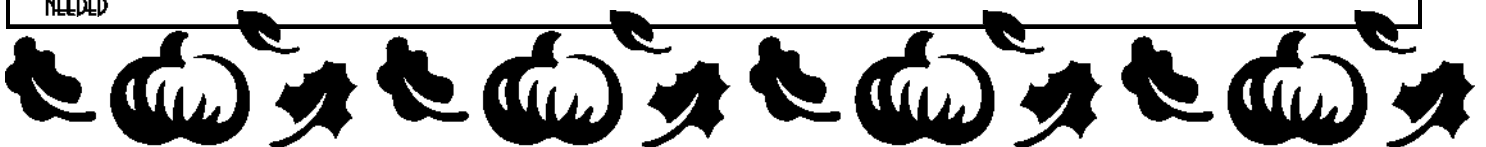
